This will include referrals to agencies that provide services you may want to try out or that have helped you in the past.

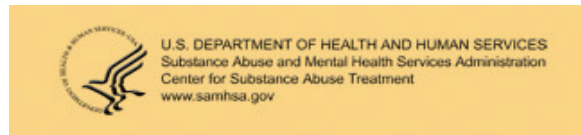

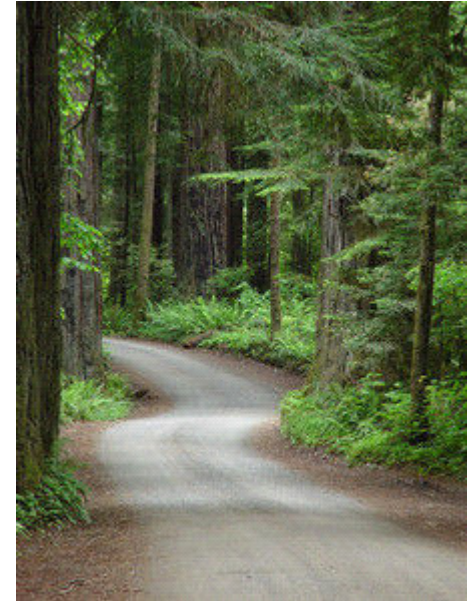

All About ATR III

What is Access to Recovery?

ATR, or Access to Recovery, is a federally-funded program that provides services to people in recovery from alcohol and other drug use. These services include traditional clinical treatment, as well as non-traditional recovery supports. ATR III is designed to give people with substance use disorders wider access to people, programs, and systems within the community that can help them start or continue their journey on the road to recovery.

How is ATR different from other programs?

All program participants will work with a Care Coordinator who will help them develop a recovery plan. One of the key components of ATR is that recipients are allowed genuine, free, and independent choice of providers that will best meet their recovery needs. ATR also offers recipients the ability to choose from an array of providers that include licensed clinical treatment agencies as well as grassroots, community, and faith-based organizations.

What does ATR pay for?

ATR offers a wide variety of clinical and recovery support services. Services include, but are not limited to, care coordination, recovery management services, recovery oriented vocational services, faith recovery support services, and housing assistance.



How do I know if I am eligible for ATR III?

You must be age 18 or older, and a resident of the state of Connecticut with a substance abuse disorder or history. You will also need to have a connection with a state agency or program called a portal. Specific populations within the following portals qualify for ATR: Court Support Services Division, Department of Correction, Department of Children and Families, National Guard and Veterans, and the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services.

How do I sign up for services?

If you are interested or think you qualify for the ATR III program, please call the toll-free customer service center. An ATR III staff member will screen you for eligibility and, if you qualify, will help you set an appointment to meet with a Care Coordinator. If you don't qualify or decide not to participate, staff can direct you to other community resources that you may find helpful.

What is a Care Coordinator?

A Care Coordinator (CC) is the person who will work by your side to outline your ATR III recovery goals.

- The CC is your main contact for ATR.
- You can ask the CC questions about the program, or share any concerns about services you may be receiving.
- The CC is there to help you develop a recovery plan and a network of people and services to help you.
- The CC can't do the work for you, but can be there to support you.
